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


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A couple adored the birth of their little angel, while a couple saw their baby being flunked into the arms of death. A daughter gained comfort in the arms of her mother, while another daughter saw her mother being crumbled under a building. Someone cherished their morning nap while another's day came crashing down. The loss of a son, the loss of a daughter, the loss of one or both parents, the loss of luxuries and millions of losses, hurtful losses, gut- wrenching losses, all occurred simultaneously in the beautiful lands of Turkey. A place which the world adored and utterly was famous for its unique historical features and dozens of tourist attractions.

On February 6, around 4:15 a.m. local time, a magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck south central Turkey near the Turkey/Syria border. Eleven minutes later, it was followed by a magnitude 6.7 aftershock. The largest aftershock was a M7.5 aftershock which struck 95 km (~60 miles) to the north. USGS observations and analyses indicate all these events are occurring within the East Anatolian fault system.

Though an earthquake of this magnitude is rare anywhere in the world, this type of event is generally expected on long, plate-boundary strike-slip faults.

"It's difficult to watch this tragedy unfold, especially since we've known for a long time that the buildings in the region were not designed to withstand earthquakes," said USGS scientist David Wald. "An earthquake this size has the potential to be damaging anywhere in the world, but many structures in this region are particularly vulnerable."

The two largest earthquakes in the recent series are relatively shallow, with the main shock 18 kilometers, or 11 miles, deep and the 7.5 magnitude aftershock at 10 kilometers (just over 6 miles) deep. As the quakes are relatively shallow, the intensity of the shaking is severe.

The death toll from a strong earthquake in south-eastern Turkey, near Syria's border, could rise eight-fold, the World Health Organisation had warned.

The toll, increased rapidly since the first earthquake struck early on Monday morning. About 12 hours later, a second powerful tremor hit further north.

Rescuers have been combing through mountains of rubble in freezing and snowy conditions to find survivors.

Many of the victims are in war-torn northern Syria, where millions of refugees live in camps on both sides of the border with Turkey. There have been dozens of fatalities

reported in rebel-held areas. Thousands of buildings across both the countries have collapsed, and several videos show the moment they fell, as onlookers ran for cover. Many buildings that were as large as 12 storey high are now flattened, roads have been destroyed and there are huge mountains of rubble as far as the eye can see.

Among the buildings destroyed was Gaziantep Castle, an historical landmark that has stood for more than 2,000 years.

The BBC's Middle East correspondent Anna Foster, reporting from the Turkish city of Osmaniye, near the epicenter, described a devastating scene.

"It's absolutely pouring with rain which is hampering the rescue efforts. There is no power at all in the city tonight." We're still feeling regular after-shocks... and there are still concerns that there may be still more buildings to collapse," our correspondent said.

The million dollar question arises; are we feeling the pain of our Muslim Brothers and sisters in Turkey who are experiencing the greatest catastrophe of their lives? How can we be of assistance to them?

Whenever Jasked my four-year-old what she wanted to be when she grew up, she had a plain and straightforward answer - A follower of RasoolAllah(PBUH). To her, he was the only person worthy of admiration and being followed. But recently, her conversations began changing from "How did RasoolAllah(s) eat?", "I am sitting like RasoolAllah(s)", or "I cleaned my plate like RasoolAllah(s)!" to: "I will finish my food like Cinderella", and "If I eat all my apples I will be pretty like Cinderella."

What at first seemed like an innocent infatuation with a childhood fairytale character soon got me worried. This replacement of idealism was not a small matter - in her innocent mind, a fairytale character dancing with a prince was becoming more inspiring than the best of all creation. into the children's lives and has replaced the divine idealism with the fictional superhero cults of the modern world. Is this a problem? Should we be worried? Isn't the impact of these fictional characters alarming while rearing a Muslim Child? Or does it even matter who we idolize from a young age? Heroes and role models are an integral part of our society. They are an integral part of education, how we view the world, and what we inspire to be. Infact, superheroes or some sort of heroes have always existed in all sorts of cultures. Greek, Norse, Egyptian, Celtic, Hindu and all other pagan mythologies are a representation of the need to believe in someone as our saviors and role model. They represent the need to believe in something bigger than ourselves(supernatural), to be in awe of something, to idolize something. Pagans societies in the past came up with their own superheroes in the shape of gods. demi-gods and the demons they fought against, very much like the superhero culture of a superhero fighting a villain. Can this fit into not only the Islamic, but any of the Abrahamic religions worldview? We believe in a real power bigger than ourselves, our Savior, our Protector, Our Creator, Allah (swt). As for our role models, the stories Allah(swt) himself narrates to us from the past in the Quran and other divine books sure give us our very own real set of them: Adam, Ibrahim, Noah, Mosa, Isa, Dawood, Suleiman, Yusuf, Yacob, Yahya, Zakariyya, Saleh, Lut, Luqman, People of the Cave, and many more. And then Allah laid out in front of us the entire life of the best human in the world to take after.

For many young people, superheroes have displaced traditional beliefs. The superhero role is similar to the pagan structure of the past. These new forms of gods speak the truth for their audience and present different models of behaviors, values and norms of an increasingly diverse 21st-century society. In the words of Robert Mcgracy, "Superheroes have become the new gods and Marvel is a new brand of religion in a secularizing post-Christian society." The legacy of satan to create fake super-beings and role models has been carried into the modern world.

Superheroes having similarities with pagan religions doesn't come as a surprise. Satan is progressive and he employs innovative methods to misguide humanity. His purpose remains the same but he advances and changes his methods as humans progress and change. Traditional paganism (old school shirk) seems backwards to a modern man who is more driven by scientific evolution and the values introduced by it. So, this entertainment becomes the source to keep up the advancement of misguidance.

As a tool of Satan, Marvel and other comic

companies have used these heroes to promote secular values. Marvel, the biggest superhero comic brand, consistently portrays god characters in their movies. Itshows that they are all not heavenly beings who present themselves as good, but are secretly awful usually evil. It's clear that Marvel is setting up a conflict between humans and gods to be at the forefront of its next big storyline. The conflict is evident from many comic tales. In "Loki," the villain someone who remains a supposedly all-powerful, all-knowing being whose primary goal is to keep order in time and space by making sure that all events go according to his cosmic plan, and erasing anyone from an existence who deviates from that plan. Then it's exposed that he's a time-traveler named Kang who kidnapped people and brainwashed them into joining his time cop force to enforce his preferred timeline - 'imposing' a plan by using supernatural powers. In "The Eternals," The Celestials are immortal gods who created every living thing in the universe and say they created the angelic Eternals to protect the humans of Earth from demonic Deviants. In reality, they created the Eternals to help humans evolve so the humans could help the planet give birth to a new Celestial-destroying the Earth in the process.

In "Moon Knight," the prophet of the god, Ammit is the main villain. Ammit wishes to return to Earth to kill everyone who will one day become evil before they have a chance to commit that evil. She's opposed by Konshu, a god who abuses and manipulates Marc Spector/Steven Grant — (two sides of a man with a split personality) into being his avatar to stop her. In the process, Konshu becomes nearly as brutal as Ammit until Marc and Steve stand up to him.

It seems the super-hero culture is as popular amongst the Abrahamic religions as it is in the secular world. Three basic beliefs the superpowers of Allah, the perfection in the role model of Muhammad (PBUH), the moral code and the way of life defined by Islam - are subtly challenged by super-hero obsession

Superheroes are the prophets of the new religion. They bring their morality and set of values. There are a lot of different superheroes out there and many of these heroes were created or later changed according to cultural trends of the time. For example, the creation of Superman Comics in 1938 was an attempt to provide hope for society after the difficulties of the Great Depression and impending World War II. Now this is a perfect medium to familiarize the value of modern Godless society. Characters of homosexuality e.g batwoman sexualizedfemale superheros, and associated power with vulgar clothing. Whatever value needs to be popularized, they have the most attractive and popular medium.

When a society with a strong belief in Muhammad (pbuh) as a true role model questions a child what they want to be when they grow up, and they answer - 'superman', that should worry us. We are replacing their deep love and connection with RasoolAllah(pbuh) with something that will take place of almost a religious importance in their life. When you come across children willing to be bitten by spiders to become spiderman or a seven year old practicing grabbing things with his "spider web" we need to understand the effect of exposure to this culture is not innocent. Getting rid of fairytale culture for its messed up sense of reality was one thing but to fight an entire cult of Marvel and DC is a task we need to start considering. Are the role models of secularism becoming our children's new role models?

Ali bin Hussain- the grandson of Ali ibn Abi Talib would say we were taught the Seerah of Rasool Allah like we were taught the Quran. That is how important Seerah was for them. Shouldn't the early years of their life be spent forming the pegs of love for Muhammad(p-buh), Ibrahim, Musa, Esa and other prophets? Shouldn't the stories that surround our homes be stories of the marvelous humans which stood against the entire society. Shouldn't we be inspiring them to be more

like Abu Bakr and Uthman(r) and other sahabas. Shouldn't they be inspired by real life stories of justice in the time of Omar. Contrary to this, Satan inspired Nazr bin Haris to bring tales from Iran to keep people away from the guidance when the Quran was being revealed. Stories are important. They can not be taken lightly. What stories we tell our children form the structure of our society. Stories of superman will form the structure he is advising.

For a moment, if we put aside their structural value in society, wastage of money and time, many of the production houses continue to use pagan mythology to sell their movies. Thor, Incredible Hercules are to name a few. How are we comfortably accepting this level of shirk in our homes? When a 7-year-old was told that the planets, created by Allah, were named after Greek and Roman gods, she went into a state of shock and came up with her own list of names for the planets. That's the sensitivity we need to harbor regarding shirk, let alone take it as a norm in our society in the form of entertainment. We are allowing our children to take morality from a source different from Divine Knowledge and allowing them to be comfortable with the ideas of shirk. It's something that should concern us.

#### A Course Review on "Political Maps"

Ummu Abdullah Abdurrahman gives us a alimpse of all the fun and frolic that rolled out during the journey around the world in a Radiant Tarbiyah online course

"Assalamu'alaikum, hello my friends."

A friendly greeting with a cheerful face started the class every Monday and Wednesday evening, at 6pm Pakistan time. My son, Quasim, was eagerly waiting for the class since 5.55pm as he did not want to be late at any cost. He likes the course, he likes the teacher.

When we saw the advertisement for the course "Let's Memorise Political Map in a Fun Way" by Ms. Arita, we did not think twice to register my 10-year-old son, Abdurrahman Quasim. First, we know her from our previous experience in another course, "Maths Tricks". We were satisfied with the way she taught her class last time. She is an amazing teacher, a Latvian by origin, living in Ireland. She conducted class in an amazingly fun and friendly way. Learning Maths is not scarier in her class. Second, the course fee is quite economical, Rs 1500 or USD 9 for five weeks, with a total of 10 sessions. Third, my son loves to learn geography. He is fond of exploring different countries' facts; maps, flags, languages, and other cultural aspects. He dreams to travel around the world someday.

Before the class started on January 2nd, 2023, the Radiant Tarbiyah admin formed a WhatsApp group for our class and started sharing some files that we will need during the course. We got three kinds of colourful pdf files in our initial class; the name of the countries, the countries' facts, and geography maps of seven continents. Since the course title was something to help kids to memorise the political geography of the countries, flashcards were needed as helping kits. Parents were supposed to take print out the pdf files and cut it as flashcards.

Ms. Arita divided the five week lessons of political geography level one into five rounds. One round consisted of ten countries, unlike the last round which was less than ten countries. Hence kids learnt the countries' facts in a fun and engaging way. Not only did they have to figure out the location of the countries on the map (in less than 30 seconds), but they also had to learn their respective official countries name, flags, capital, language, and cool facts. The last one was interesting, it was about something unique that might distinguish one country from another. Some of the examples of Countries' Cool Facts are as below.



She demonstrated how to say 'ni hao (it means 'hello' in Chinese), along with the tones and gestures. As a person who has lived in China for some years, I kind of agree with her way. Other cultural aspects were also given during the course; in some countries it's considered impolite to wear a hat indoors, it was suggested to remove shoes

When kids learnt about China, they did not only learn about its location on the map, but she also taught some words in Chinese.

before entering the house, etc.

During the whole course, kids were assigned some homework task. Ms Arita just gave homework in brief, and let kids use their wild imagination to apply it. The first homework was to point out the location of the country on the map in less than 30 seconds. Most kids did it together with their moms and recorded their learning in a video. For my kid, I let him do it by himself. He recorded his learning using role-play method, acted as a spidermen



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to point out the countries' location and presented in Russian, with the help of his brother, a 13-year-boy (The video is there on Radiant Tarbiyah youtube channel). He chose this way since the teacher understands Russian. So, he learnt how to speak with the help of Google Translation.

For the second homework, kids were supposed to draw a map of any country with some details of the country's facts. This time my kid did not draw a map, but he built a 3D map of Turkey. It took one week to complete the project. Along with the embossed map, they made a lapbook about Turkey containing Turkey's history, capital, language, and products. During their research they found some cool facts- Santa Claus was born in Turkey! When the kids learnt about Oman and its shipping industry, the teacher assigned homework to build a ship. Instead of making origami paper ships, my kid presented the ship using cardboard and some disposal materials. He accomplished this project in less than two weeks. He named the ship, "The Atlantis." He was very much sure that people can travel around the world with his "Atlantis" in less than 80 days (we referred to a novel by Jules Verne, "Around the World in 80 days").

When the teacher took the kids to Egypt (virtually), she assigned them hands-on activity to make a pyramid. I found students' interests were improved judging by the variety of creative projects they presented in the WhatsApp group; Egyptian pyramids made using papers, legos, cards, etc.

However, my son did not intend to make an Egyptian pyramid. Instead, he made a Cambodian pyramid diorama, Koh Ker Temple-a remote archaeological site in Northern Cambodia. Well, with this one project he learnt political geography, history, math-geometry, arts, architecture, etc.

The last homework was to create a country, an imaginary country. Some kids presented their imaginary kids in Pizza country, Ice cream country, etc. My kid thought about drawing an imaginary country map on paper which actually required serious urban planning skills. Since Quasim loves the rabbit, Bunny cartoons character, even made himself as a "Bunny Sultan" leading an imaginary "Bunny Empire", and is crazily fond of eating carrots, so my kids decided to draw a map of Bunny Kingdom. He finished the task two days before the due date; a detailed map of Bunny Kingdom, along with symbols and legend that explained the infrastructures inside: railroads, stations, schools, houses, bank, shop, restaurant, offices, bank, and palace. Since it was an imaginary fairyland, they needed to add: carrot woods, bunny jungle, corn beach, etc. The Bunny Kingdom is presented on colourful paper. When the teacher asked him where he got this idea, he honestly replied, "From the Minecraft game." Some of my friends who also enrolled their kids in this class were highly impressed with the course. Their kids learnt a lot, and most importantly they enjoyed it. We travelled around the world in five weeks, from home.

The monk there, Nestora, said that none but a Prophet ever sat beneath that tree. She then consulted her cousin Warga bin Nawful. who was a pious Christian scholar who confirmed that this is the kind of person who is mentioned in bible to be the next and the last Prophet. Hadhrat Khadija then proppsed the Prophet ! Their marriage was arranged by Abu Talib.

Hadhrat Khadija RTA was 40 and Muhammad 🜉 was 25 when they got married and lived together for 25 years. She was an ideal wife who stood beside her husband and helped him in every way. She was a famous and well respected female in pagan regime although generally females were treated like animals. Allah had chosen the best for his Prophet SAW. Hadhrat Muhammad 🚑 did not marry again as long as she was alive.

#### Children

Hadhrat khadija RTA had married twice before she married the Prophet 🕮. Both her husbands had died. She bore children from both of them. It is said that she and Muhammad had six children, two sons and four daughters. Both the sons, Qasim and Abdul-

lah also known as Tahir and Tayyab died in their childhood. Daughters were Zainab, Ruqayyah, Umme Kulsoom and Fatima. (May Allah be pleased with them all).

#### Religion

It is reported that she neither believed nor worshipped the idols in pre-Islamic days. Her piety and chastity gave her another name, Tahira, the pure. The Prophet got his Prophethood after they were wedded for 15 years and she got the honour of being the first person to accept Islam. After the first revelation in cave Hira, Muhammad came back worried and frightened to find his loving and caring wife consoling him by saying:

Allah would surely protect you from any danger, and would never allow anyone to revile you as you are a man of peace and reconciliation and always extended hand of friendship to all.

This proves that she was extremely far-sighted. After the declaration of Prophethood, the Kuffar of Makkah started torturing the Prophet and his followers by every mean possible. Hadhrat Khadija R.A always supported and consoled her husband and helped him fulfill his prophetic mission in those extremely difficult times. She helped him financially as well as morally. People of Makkah became the worst enemies of Muslims. They harassed them and adopted every possible cruel manner to bring the Muslims back to their old religion. On those critical moments when oppressors wanted to sabotage Islam this woman spent her money to pay ransom for Muslim slaves, feed the hungry Muslims and provide them with basic necessities of life.

This princess of Quraysh did not only invest her wealth in the way of Islam, she also bore the physical hardships when the Kuffar declared political and economical boycott, during which Muslims were forced to live in the trench Shaab abi Talib where they went for days without food or drink. In these moments of trial she didn't leave her husband's side as she had firm and fervent faith in Allah and his messenger SAW. These three years of tough hardships made her very weak and she finally met Allah SWT in Ramadhan in the tenth year of Prophethood.
